## DATE AND VENUE

The conference will be held between 4–6 November 2016 in Budapest at Kodolányi János University of Applied Sciences, Budapest Campus (Budapest, Frangepán utca 50–56).

The registration will begin at 9:00 in the morning of Friday, 4 November. Registration fees are required to be paid during the registration in case of selecting payment in cash. Conference material and schedule will be given to you at the registration. It is suggested to arrive in time in order to follow the scheduled opening session at 10:00.

We request our speakers to bring 2 copies of full paper OR hand-out printed. Hard copies of the papers or hand-outs can be found later at the information desk where you can borrow them to read during the programme. Please read and return the paper you have selected as promptly as possible to make them available to all participants.

We are working to a very tight schedule which means punctuality is extremely important. We expect you to be on time so that sessions can start promptly and enough time is left for discussion.

## CONFERENCE AGENDA & INFORMATION

The registration fee of the 'Security and sovereignty in the 21st century' conference is 15 euro for listeners and 75 euro for speakers. Registration fee includes one copy of conference materials and unlimited tea/coffee and refreshments during the 2 days of conference (lunch is not included). The price does not include public transport and accommodation fees.

The event will last for two plus one days and is divided into sessions (see the programme document). Keynote speakers will give 20-minutes lectures followed by 10-minutes Q&A. Guest speakers will get maximum 15 minutes for presentation. Each session contains 20 minutes Q&A and discussion.

The conference will be opened by the moderator who will introduce the speakers on stage. Speakers will be presenting on stage sequentially in sessions.

You are requested to arrive at the conference room 20 minutes before the starting time of your presentation, in order to the event not to be delayed.

The conference language is English. No translation services will be available.

Participants are expected to dress smart casual during the programme.

#### **PRESENTATION**

Due to the number of speakers and conference schedule Guest Speakers are required to hold their presentation within a 15-minutes timeframe.

#### From Liszt Ferenc Airport:

- There are different ways to get to the conference location from the airport. There are several **taxis** which can take you directly to the conference location in 30–40 minutes (price usually varies between 30–40 euro).
- The transport from Liszt Ferenc Budapest Airport to the conference location is also simple by using **public transport** and takes about 70–90 minutes. At the airport take bus 200E to Köbánya-Kispest Metro station (last stop). Change to underground nr.3 and get off at Lehel tér (13 stops). At Lehel tér get on tram 14 to Frangepán utca (6 stops).

- From **Déli Railway Terminal** or **Keleti Railway Terminal** take the underground nr.2 to Deák tér and change here to underground nr.3. and get off at Lehel tér (13 stops). At Lehel tér get on tram 14 to Frangepán utca (6 stops).
- From **Nyugati Railway Terminal** and **Népliget Central Bus Terminal** take underground nr.3 and get off at Lehel tér (13 stops). At Lehel tér get on tram 14 to Frangepán utca (6 stops).
