How do you see Europe (European Union) nowadays?

Apart from political and other insecurities happening, I see EU as something positive. It has a great impact on bringing people from all over the continent together that we can feel more connected and is creating many opportunities for the youngsters.

What kind of options does the youth/ youth with fewer opportunities in Europe have nowadays?

There are many options. I am not familiar with all of them, but some, that I know, are: European voluntary service, youth exchanges, internships, loans, ...

What kind of methods of inclusion, to attend projects abroad, have you experienced? Which methods have you used in/at your work?

I'm still fairly new in the field of working with youngsters. Nevertheless, I think reaching out to young people, especially those with fewer opportunities, is very important. One can do that in many ways, but from my point of view educating from an early age is most important. That way youngsters get to know and are aware of opportunities waiting for them. Another important thing is cooperation between organisations involved in youth work on both - local and international level. Getting to them through different events and activities, that are interesting to young generations, work very well also.

What does European Voluntary Service mean to you?

Although I've never participated I see it as a great way for young people to get some life-lasting experiences, to grow and to find out what they are capable of. I think it has an impact on the hosting part (city, organization, ...) too. Local people learn a lot by spending time with the volunteer, getting to know their background and a way of thinking. It's definitely an opportunity to connect, one way or another.

How do you see Europe (European Union) nowadays?

European Union is a political and economic set of nations unifying their diversity and cooperating according to the common values/ goals of peace, freedom, respect and equality, solidarity and inclusion, cooperation, democracy and development.

What kind of options does the youth/ youth with fewer opportunities in Europe have nowadays?

Although the opportunities, provided to the young people, have been raising and developing in a positive way in the past few decades, there is still a lot of work to be done in the sense of spreading the accurate and useful information, increasing the participation of the youngsters in voluntary work and other international opportunities that improve their education, experience and personal development. Specifically, I believe the focus should now be to broaden this involvement among young people with fewer opportunities.

What kind of methods of inclusion, to attend projects abroad, have you experienced? Which methods have you used in/at your work?

By enrolling E+ projects as a study exchange and an EVS project, I have participated in (and now also helped in the planning and implementation of) training courses that gather young people with this aim. These trainings are extremely enriching as tools of a non-formal education, as they contribute for the personal development of young (and old!) people, as well as for the global development of the society, putting on practice the actions that lead us to achieve the common goals of EU.

Besides, the methods of inclusion that I experienced were normally based on talks or small presentation, trying to spread the information as much as possible in a local and close environment. I believe that the first step to get people – especially the ones with fewer opportunities – aware of the possibilities that are out there, is the direct contact and communication with peers who experienced it before. It gives a human and real touch, with a completely different impact than paper or online contact.

What does European Voluntary Service mean to you?

European Voluntary Service is a program of Erasmus+ that allows people aged from 17 to 30, from European and other Partner countries, to work abroad in various fields as volunteers, aiming to strengthen the European citizenship identity and to implement the EU values. It promotes the mobility of young people around the world for an intercultural exchange, breaking borders and stereotypes, creating bonds and improving communication within people with different backgrounds. EVS is an enriching experience where volunteers have the chance to try and develop their interests and competences, while they can, simultaneously, have a positive impact on a local community.

How do you see Europe (European **Union) nowadays?**

It has some positives and some negatives. The good part is that it considers the quality of life of European citizens as something important (usually). Also the chances it provides for young people to work and volunteer abroad. At the same time, though, it's a little hypocritical because a lot of money (more than needed) goes to things that are not useful for society as a whole. It's also very unstable when it comes to maintaining its unity and although it would be helpful to have a union of cooperative states in the long-term, the EU is not very successful at that and it's becoming less and less competitive globally.

What kind of options does the youth/ youth with fewer opportunities in Europe have nowadays?

The youth as a whole has some opportunities, depends on where in Europe they live and how well they are informed. There are plenty of problems when it comes to proceeding in life and seizing chances, especially during a general political and financial crisis. The good thing is that there are volunteering and training programmes for those with fewer opportunities and that works towards their integration in society. The bad thing is that these projects often are not enough for everyone and not every country promotes these opportunities enough. For example in Germany many services are covered but the situation in the Balkan countries is not the same. That's the state's fault as well because many times European funds are not used appropriately.

What kind of methods of inclusion, to attend projects abroad, have you experienced? Which methods have you used in/at your work?

Firstly people who were included in programmes themselves suggested me to join for the same purpose as well. Afterwards it was the social media that provides information to anyone, so we're all free to apply. Then it was the local organization hosting a preparation meeting and communicating with us, so that we form a team spirit and start talking to each other and cooperate. They were available (organisation and participants) via social media, telephone, email and even in the organisation office. It is similar with the receiving organisation abroad, only that they also have group activities, discussions and free time spent together as a group.

Personally as a Pride volunteer (haven't been one for long) I've been using social media and freely talked with people in order to attract them to the purpose. Additionally there are activities and weekly informative meetings that are open for anyone interested in LGBTQ+ issues. Moreover we host multiple events throughout the year and we have the 4-day Pride festival for visibility and action.

What does European Voluntary Service mean to you?

The title EVS means volunteering/working somewhere for a few months in order to help achieve an aim that is useful for humanity. In another way it's a change of life, a tremendous experience and a big leap out of the comfort zone, because we're all afraid to try something new and to do something we haven't done before. You become a citizen of the world and responsible for it.

How do you see Europe (European Union) nowadays?

How do you see Europe (European **Union) nowadays?**

Due to having an academic background in International Relations, when asked about my opinion on Europe and/or the European Union nowadays, I cannot help but approach the question from a critical perspective. In short, as a result of recent international events, which are highly affecting the EU as a whole, I see great fractures within the European community, which are highlighted by the rising nationalism and euroscepticism within the member states. I believe that the European Union has taken a significant turn compared to the times it was established: the Union's initial efforts built on common values shaping European identity seem to be fading. Despite visible struggles within the Union, I still believe that being a member state of the EU provides great opportunities in several areas, for instance and very importantly especially in the context of such projects like the "Creative Innovative Approaches Investigators" the field of education.

What kind of options does the youth/ youth with fewer opportunities in **Europe have nowadays?**

Being a citizen of an EU member country offers a lot in many ways, including the many initiatives aimed to prosper the youth. People do not face as many obstacles, for instance, when traveling to another country to seek better opportunities, either academic or professional. The European education system is coherent and of high quality, offering great opportunities to not only the youth, but to adults as well, for example in the framework of the EU's Lifelong Learning Program. In addition, the EU with its efforts to decrease youth unemployment increases the chances of youngsters to find a job suitable for them in the competitive market.

What kind of methods of inclusion, to attend projects abroad, have you experienced? Which methods have you used in/at your work?

Some of the projects I have previously attended were aimed at social inclusion, mainly focusing on the inclusion of youth and youth with fewer opportunities. One of the Erasmus+ training courses I participated in was built around the topic of youth employability, with a special focus on the opportunities offered by Erasmus+. Some of the methods the training used to increase youth employability were interview simulation(s) and the creation of a CV - both American style and EuroPass. I find these basic and easily implementable methods very useful, since everyone experiences the struggles of job hunting, the preparation process before an interview and the interview itself. Properly preparing youngsters for job search can be considered a great way of increasing their chances of employability.

What does European Voluntary Service mean to you?

The European Voluntary Service is a once-ina-lifetime opportunity for young people to be involved in a community's everyday life. While they not only help out people in need, they have the chance to explore their abilities, as well as to get to know themselves better by experiencing something really special. As far as I heard from people participating in an EVS project, the volunteering is a life-changing experience.

How do you see Europe (European Union) nowadays?

One part of increasing inclusion is definitely raising awareness about the opportunities/projects and explaining the concept of those to the target group. Lots of young people (no matter if with fewer opportunities or not) are unaware of such opportunities even though they would be perfect candidates to take part in such projects. We used to use methods such as workshops in youth centers, meetings with students in schools/universities, use mobile youth work to meet young people in places where they like to spend their time and promoting the opportunities there (such as main squares of the cities etc.). The general idea is to bring them the information and make the process easier, accessible and more personal. Such methods also provide an easy opportunity for young people to get information faster and easier.

What does European Voluntary Service mean to you?

Before doing EVS I thought it would be just a fun and enriching experience, an exciting opportunity to step out from your comfort zone in an international environment. It was all that as well but it was so much more than I could ever imagine. EVS was a real life-school and taught me some of the most valuable lessons and skills I've acquired in life so far. Before the projects, which I took part in, the facilitators always tried to connect all the participants by, for example, making Facebook groups. Another way of inclusion is helping people who do not speak English to participate in the activities by asking other participants (or the leader in youth exchanges) from the same country to translate for them, so they also have the chance to be a part of the youth projects and learn the language.


